Career Of The Week

Anthropologist



What you'll do

Your day-to-day will include tasks such as:

- Gather and analyze artifacts and skeletal remains to increase knowledge of ancient cultures.
- Study archival collections of primary historical sources to help explain the origins and development of cultural patterns.
- Teach and mentor undergraduate and graduate students in anthropology.
- Write about and present research findings for a variety of specialized and general audiences.
- Plan and direct research to characterize and compare the economic, demographic, health care, social, political, linguistic, and religious institutions of distinct cultural groups, communities, and organizations.
- Build geographic information systems (GIS) to record, analyze, and cartographically represent the distribution of languages, cultural and natural resources, land use, and settlement patterns of specific populations.
- Observe and measure bodily variations and physical attributes of different human groups.
- Collaborate with economic development planners to decide on the implementation of proposed development policies, plans, and programs based on culturally institutionalized barriers and facilitating circumstances.

- Conduct participatory action research in communities and organizations to assess how work is done and to design work systems, technologies, and environments.
- Apply traditional ecological knowledge and assessments of culturally distinctive land and resource management institutions to assist in the resolution of conflicts over habitat protection and resource enhancement.

Working hours and environment

Most people say the following:

- Work With Work Group or Team: Important.
- Work Schedules: Irregular (changes with weather conditions, production demands, or contract duration).
- Spend Time Sitting: More than half the time.
- Responsibility for Outcomes and Results: Moderate responsibility.
- Freedom to Make Decisions: A lot of freedom.
- Duration of Typical Work Week: More than 40 hours.
- Coordinate or Lead Others: Fairly important.

Career path and progression

You could work as a researcher or educator for a college, university or museum.

Outside of academia, anthropologist graduates can be found in a wide range of roles, including:

- foreign service officer
- public relations officer
- conducting site assessments for cultural resource management firms
- curating artifacts for research museums

Skills required

You'll need skills in:

- Reading Comprehension
- Writing
- Active Listening
- Speaking
- Science

Entry requirements

You'll need a good degree, ideally a first class or upper second class, in Anthropology or a related field. You'll also need to have completed or be working towards a postgraduate master's or PhD in Anthropology, and have academic work published.

Some Anthropology researchers begin by working as a research assistant, for which you will need to have a master's degree in Anthropology or a related field.

To apply for an undergraduate degree in Anthropology, you'll usually need a minimum of:

- 2 to 3 A levels, or the equivalent
- GCSEs: English at C or 4.

Non-academic careers in Anthropology vary widely, but most will require you to possess at least an undergraduate degree in this subject.

5 reasons you should kickstart your career with an apprenticeship

National Apprenticeship Week is coming up from 6th - 12th February!

Chances are you're starting to think about what you might like to do after you leave school or college. Did you know that an apprenticeship could be your ticket to a high-skilled job straight out of education? And what's more, you'll get paid a wage and gain qualifications without having to take on any student debt.

Here are our top 5 reasons to apply for an apprenticeship:

1. You'll get paid a wage

Apprenticeships are now a gateway into jobs which require higher-level qualifications such as foundation degrees, bachelor's degrees and even master's degrees. You could train as an engineer, a software developer, a solicitor, a nurse - there are even apprenticeships in academia!

2. You'll train in a high-skilled job

There is a minimum wage for apprentices, called the apprenticeship wage. This year, it is set at £4.81. It goes up in stages until you get to the age of 23, when it reaches £9.50, so long as you have completed the first year of your apprenticeship. The apprenticeship wage is increased every year. Remember this is the minimum - in practice, many apprentices earn much more.

3. You could get a university degree



If you complete a degree apprenticeship, you will gain a university degree. But unlike with the traditional university journey, you won't graduate with thousands of pounds of tuition fee debt because your employer will pay the costs for you.

4. You'll learn on the job

As an apprentice, you will gain the knowledge and skills for your role on the job. You'll spend most of your time in the office, lab, factory or field, where you will be trained up by experienced colleagues. Depending on your apprenticeship level, you will also study with a training provider, in college or at university, working towards a qualification which will support you in your day-to-day job.

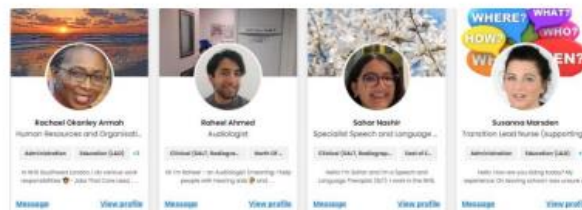
Health Education England is teaming up with Connectr to deliver a one-of-a-kind virtual careers programme from **Autumn 2022**. The programme will run until **April 2023**.

Multiply is a new government-funded programme to help adults improve their numeracy skills.

If you're aged 19 and over and don't have maths GCSE at grade C (or equivalent), you can access free numeracy courses through Multiply to build your confidence with numbers.

There will be courses for beginners to more advanced courses and the chance to progress to GCSE Maths, Functional Skills Qualifications or equivalent' as GCSE etc are not being offered through Multiply
